

"The Signs were There"

While having a casual discussion over coffee, an old friend mentioned about this book and insisted that it's probably the best book on accounting. Before we said bye to each other for that day, an order had been placed on Amazon and my bag had it in 3 days.

A quote of Daily Telegraph on the cover page says "Buy this book. It's a worthwhile investment" and I fully agree with this statement, especially if you are in the accounting profession (auditor, investigator or advisor) or an investor (active or passive). Tim Steer, a chartered accountant with experience of working in the big4 and a successful investment analyst takes you through stories of companies which had a big fall at the stock market and demonstrates in easy language for



you to understand what was going wrong there. All these stories take you through extracts of published annual reports, analyzed to reveal secrets.

These 27 stories not only fascinate but also empower the reader by putting a spotlight on areas where red flags could have been identified. How did these companies manage to keep demonstrating good results by capitalizing expenses instead of charging profits? Sometimes by adding salary expenses to assets mentioning that these were for development of intangible asset like software or adding these to capital work in progress and other times by inflating valuation of inventories, besides many others.

The book highlights that items like intangibles, exceptional items, and increasing aging of debtors etc. indicate potential risks that you must be weary of. An important caveat here is that these items may not always translate to accounting frauds. While most of it is permitted under Accounting Standards theoretically, these are often difficult to pass a simple test of professional skepticism in practical situations.

The author could have enriched these stories by including anecdotal evidence. I wonder what the experts involved in these downfalls would have to say, and whether some of them did, in fact, notice the red flags personally (and I am not talking about the people who have designed these). The personalized accounts of these downfalls would not only tell us the other side the story but also offer key life lessons in navigating tricky situations and making difficult choices.

Overall, the book is a good read for you, if interested in knowing how accounting standards can be used (or misused) by companies for switching profits from one year to another or showing desired results by using blurred lines to remain on right side of the regulations. The book will help Investors in noticing warning signs, auditors in being more thorough, and advisors in negotiating and doing smart due diligence.







A travelogue from Jibhi




