DIRECTOR'S CUT

Beyond the comfort zone

When I first joined ASA, my role was focused on the Indian market. But very soon, I was entrusted with a responsibility I had never imagined—starting off and handling the Global Audit Offshoring vertical. What began with just four staff and one core PCAOB client felt like stepping into completely uncharted territory.

The challenges were immediate and steep: navigating SEC regulations, mastering US GAAP, adapting to unfamiliar audit software, managing multi-accent client communications across time zones, and leading a team equally new to global audits. Each day demanded that I learn, adapt, and deliver at a pace faster than I thought possible. There were moments of uncertainty, but I leaned on the confidence built from managing Indian clients and used it as my anchor in this new global arena.

A year into the journey, things began to shift. The same client who once tested our resilience began entrusting us with more work—and importantly, acknowledged their satisfaction with our output. That validation wasn't just a professional win—it was the turning point. We weren't just surviving; we were building something sustainable and impactful.

More recently, we were handed a large, complex assignment from another client that tested our capacity in every possible way. It challenged us with scale, coordination, and technical depth—but we completed it successfully. That project cemented the fact that we could handle high-stakes, high-pressure global work with quality and precision.

Today, when I look back, the transformation is clear. From a team of 4 to nearly 40, we've grown in size, capability, and reputation. Personally, I've grown in confidence—from Manager to Associate Director, shifting from Indian clients to global ones, mastering cross-cultural communication, and delivering quality at scale. The support of my mentors has been invaluable.

What began as a role I never expected has become a journey I'm deeply grateful for. The challenges I once faced with hesitation are now the very experiences shaping my confidence to take on even more. From building trust with clients to nurturing a growing team, this journey has redefined not just my career but also my belief in what I can achieve—especially when pushed beyond my comfort zone.



Turning Chaos into Compliance

We were hired by a large multinational company having a significant presence in the consumer white goods space. The local joint venture partners were not cooperating with the foreign partner in terms of reporting requirements and cash flow management. The company's books hadn't been updated for over a year, GST filings were delayed, TDS returns were inconsistent, and statutory audits were pending. Notices from the Income Tax Department and MCA were piling up, threatening penalties and reputational damage.

Herculean task, requiring a structured, team-driven approach. We began with conducting a compliance audit to map out all overdue filings and accounting gaps. Then, a dedicated task force comprising bookkeepers, indirect tax experts, and company law professionals was formed from within the ABS teams to tackle the backlog.

The team worked in phases: first updating core ledgers, then reconciling bank statements, followed by filing past GST and TDS returns and secretarial filings. Within ten weeks, the company's books were current, and all statutory filings were submitted. Cash flow plans were prepared on a rolling quarter basis for the next 12 months. MIS reports were redesigned to include key metrics required by the foreign partner. A monthly compliance calendar was introduced with responsibility allocation, and the internal finance team was trained to maintain discipline going forward.

The transformation was not just operational; it was cultural. The entire project required clarity of thought, assessing the pitfalls of various courses of action, building a structured approach with defined timelines and responsibilities, and monitoring the deliverables closely on a daily basis. This also provided for course correction as needed..



Atlas Shrugged by Ayn Rand

Who is John Galt?

In Greek mythology, Atlas is condemned to hold the heavens on his shoulders—a symbol of endurance, strength, and burden. But what if Atlas shrugged? What if the one holding up the world simply... let go? That's the explosive premise of Ayn Rand's Atlas Shrugged, a novel that masquerades as a dystopian thriller but is, at its core, a philosophical rebellion. Published in 1957, it's Rand's magnum opus, a sweeping tale of collapse, resistance, and rebirth, driven by her radical philosophy of **Objectivism.**

The story unfolds in a world where the doers, that is, the inventors, entrepreneurs, and thinkers, are shackled by ever-growing regulations. Success is punished, mediocrity rewarded. Dagny Taggart, a brilliant railroad executive, and Hank Rearden, a steel magnate, fight to keep their industries alive as the system around them rots. Trains stop. Factories close. The brightest minds begin to vanish.



And through it all echoes a haunting question: "Who is John Galt?"

At first, it's a throwaway line, used to express helplessness, confusion, and resignation. But as the mystery deepens, we learn that John Galt is real. He's the architect of a silent revolution, leading the world's creators in a strike, not of labor, but of intellect. Galt believes that the mind is the engine of civilization, and when the minds go on strike, the world stops.

Rand's heroes are unapologetically rational, fiercely independent, and morally committed to their own happiness. Her villains are bureaucrats, collectivists, and emotional manipulators—leeches who survive by draining the energy of the productive. The message is clear: a free society must honor its creators, not crucify them.

It's a bold, provocative idea. And disturbingly familiar.

But Rand's world is starkly black and white. Her protagonists are near-perfect. Logical, driven, emotionally bulletproof. Her antagonists are cartoonishly corrupt or pathetically weak. In the real world, people are messy, conflicted, and layered. Rand's characters often feel like philosophical archetypes rather than living, breathing humans.

Still, Atlas Shrugged is undeniably powerful. It forces you to ask uncomfortable questions. What happens when the people who carry the world decide to drop it? What if the system you trust is built to punish excellence? What if the collapse isn't accidental but engineered by those who refuse to be exploited? Whether you agree with Rand or not, the book will challenge you. It will make you look at the world around you - governments, institutions, and people - and think: Is the system rewarding the right people? Or is it punishing and driving them away?

And I must confess, when I first read it, and I have read it many times, the question that pops up every time is - **Will Atlas** ever shrug?

Next came a deep dive into Sri Lanka's ancient soul: the Cave




In between, I swapped temples for tusks with a bumpy but magical safari in Kaudulla, watching herds of elephants roam free-playful calves and proud matriarchs alike.

Our first stop was Dehradun, and then a ride up to Mussoorie. After 13 hours on the road, we checked into a hotel. A few excited first-timers decided to explore Mall Road, while I, the seasoned rider, tried (unsuccessfully) to convince them to rest. This caught up with us later, as fatigue set in and we had to halt more often than planned. But that's part of the fun when riding with a mixed group.

After just 4–5 hours of sleep, we set off for Dharchula, nearly 470 km away. The route offered stunning views, winding roads, and frequent halts to soak it all in. After three major breaks, we reached around 2 AM. The local police stopped us, checked our documents, and warned us about wildlife during night rides.

We checked in and devoured our dinner—probably the best meal ever (thanks to sheer exhaustion!). The next morning, we visited the Dharchula temple, a peaceful and memorable experience. We also tasted local treats like Rabri and Gouhat, which added a delicious cultural touch.

The return journey—700+ km—was tougher, with office looming. After riding nearly 14 hours straight and just two breaks, I reached home at 6:30 AM on Monday, just in time to get ready for work.

Exhausting? Definitely.

Worth it? A thousand times yes.

It wasn't just about the kilometers—but the memories, stories, and friendships that made it epic.



Ajanta & Ellora Caves

A Timeless Journey into Stone

Ever since I first read about them in my school textbooks, I knew I'd visit the Ajanta and Ellora Caves someday. That dream finally came true this June.

We began with Ajanta Caves, located about 12 km from Aurangabad. After reaching the base, a special tourist bus took us deep between the mountains - here time seemed to stand still. The path ahead felt untouched, as if no one lived nearby. But hidden beyond those barren hills stood about 30 ancient caves, adorned with intricate paintings and sculptures. It didn't feel like a group of caves - it felt like a forgotten civilization once thrived there. The sheer thought of people building such grandeur in such isolation was awe-inspiring. I couldn't help but wonder what the first person who discovered them must have felt. Yes, it involved a lot of walking - but every step was worth it.

The first view of Ellora Caves was nothing short of breathtaking. I entered through Cave 2 - and it wasn't just a cave. It was a giant temple carved into a mountain. The aura of the place was magnetic. Some caves even had multiple floors, entirely sculpted from stone between the 5th and 10th centuries.

These weren't just artworks; they were architectural marvels. One cave looked like a king's palace, interconnected with others. I walked in one way, wandered through for 15 minutes, and exited barely 20 feet from where I began. The layout blew my mind.

And there's so much more - history, art, and adventure, all wrapped into one. Imagine trekking through ancient monuments, climbing staircases over a thousand years old - still strong and standing.

Before heading back, we also visited the Mini Taj Mahal in Aurangabad, built by Aurangaeb for his mother. It looked like a smaller, peaceful version of the real Taj -no crowds, just quiet beauty.

Just a week before the tragic incident at Pahalgam, I had the privilege of visiting Kashmir with my family - a journey that will forever remain close to my heart.




Leh-Ladakh: A Journey Through Altitude, History, and Adventure

At the Hall of Fame Museum, every artifact spoke of sacrifice. A bomb from the Kargil War inscribed "From Raveena Tandon to Nawaz Sharif" showed the wit and defiance of our soldiers.

Faith felt stronger than altitude at Gurudwara Pathar Sahib, where a sacred rock still bears Guru Nanak Dev Ji's imprint. Then came Magnetic Hill, where vehicles seem to roll uphill - a prank by the Himalayas themselves.



The ruins of Leh Palace whispered royal sagas, while rafting down the Zanskar River roared with adrenaline and laughter. At Khardung La (17,982 ft), prayer flags fluttered like whispers of courage, and in Nubra Valley, riding double-humped camels on sand dunes at 10,000 ft felt like reliving the Silk Route.

Pangong Tso dazzled with fifty shades of blue, while Umling La (19,024 ft), the world's highest motorable pass, proved altitude is also attitude.





At Hanle, the Milky Way became my night lamp - an endless galaxy with zero distractions. From reel to real, Rancho's School of 3 Idiots fame blended nostalgia with eco-friendly design. The golden sunset at Shanti Stupa spoke through silence, and barefoot walks in Hanle's marshlands felt like touching the pulse of the Himalayas. Evenings at Lala's Café added stories, art, and warmth to the journey.



Ladakh is not just a place - it's an emotion carved in altitude. Where faith meets science, deserts meet lakes, and valour meets serenity. I came here chasing adventure, but I left carrying lessons: respect the mountains, embrace the silence, and never forget to look up at the stars.

To me, handling reception is more than managing paperwork or answering phones -it's about creating positive interactions, offering help with kindness, and spreading a little joy every day.


